

Are entry gates just down the road?



Steps taken to learn Via Princesa gates feasibility

Fears about rising crime rates that have included mail and other property thefts, solicitors and squatters has led to a proposal for entry gates at the two Knolls entrances.

Although gates may deter some criminals, even supporters concede they will not stop all crime.

But before anything is installed, many questions are being asked, not the least of which is the cost.

Other questions that surfaced at two recent presentations surround the effectiveness of gates against crime as well as traffic flow and possible disruptions if for the gates aren't operat-

ing properly.

While there is support for such an idea, initial opposition to the gates, which would be used by residents of all three Knolls units, has surfaced.

Some questions remain unanswered, the first one may be in the offing.

Last week, Spring Knolls residents were asked to complete a confidential income survey to determine if grant money may be available to fund an unmanned security gate system. If approved by the California Department of Housing and Community Development the grant money could

And, not surprisingly, all three of those key issues involve money. We're working diligently to find out how much and how to make the best deals possible for all our members.

Here's a quick summary.

Trash pickup: The City of Murrieta has notified us that it's renegotiating its contracts with Waste Management, the city's trash pickup service, to respond to a new state law.

A city representative told us that starting next March, every Murrieta household will need to have three trash cans, and that your throwaways will need to be separated

(recycling, organic and food waste and regular trash). All that additional expense will be made up through a price hike.

How high that hike might be is yet to be determined.

A city official says that talks are underway with Waste Management to have a gradual rate increase for the Knolls since for years our rate has been for only one can.

A joint committee has been formed that includes representatives from all three units. It will try to negotiate the best waste management deal for all Knolls property owners. As of this writing a meeting with city negotiators has not been scheduled.

Entry gate grant money. Hopefully, you mailed in your confidential income survey related to possible grant money for entry gates on Via Princesa. The deadline was Friday. If you haven't sent it in, please do so now in the provided stamped envelope. Grant officials may not count the late mail, but it's worth a try.

You may have heard that a Knolls Security Committee has been gathering information, including costs, on a variety of gate systems for the East and West Knolls entries. No decision has been made; we're still at the info gathering stage.

The first step in evaluating such a project's feasibility is to discover if we qualify for a significant share of the cost through a grant for the gates, or other projects. So, thanks if you sent your survey in, and hurry and do so if you haven't.

West Entrance maintenance:

You've probably experienced the bumpy entrance onto Via Princesa

from Murrieta Hot Springs Road. Water from last winter's rains undermined the asphalt surface, and resulted in large potholes.

A temporary repair was made by our asphalt company; and later asphalt fill-in was done by several Spring Knolls residents who helped out, but a permanent fix is needed, and we believe the city should pay for the repair.

Board and tri-unit Umbrella Committee members met with city representatives about the water collection and reimbursement for street damage. A Murrieta Hot Springs resort representative is expected to attend a second meeting, which has not been set as of this writing.

2024 Elections: The first election notification letter was sent to members Sept. 21. If you're interested in running for a director position please contact Nominating Committee Chair Chris Heilbron, 951 805-6376, and let her know. Declared candidates will be introduced at our Oct. 21 General Meeting.

Rules & Guidelines Revamp:

Your Board is working on retooling the current Rules & Guidelines since some language conflicts with current law; and or even our CC&Rs. Also, a proposed Neighborto-Neighbor Harassment Policy written by our legal counsel will be included and made part of the Rules & Guidelines. Since the Board has received a variety of harassment complaints, we need a policy addressing such occurrences. If you have suggestions for updates to the Rules & Guidelines please email them to springknollsl@verizon.net or drop them in the slot in the office door by Oct. 11. Thank you.

Updates will be made at upcoming October meetings listed below and other future meetings.

The next Spring Knolls Association board meeting is 9:30 a.m. Oct. 18, in Eaker Hall. An agenda will be posted and blasted out on SK In the Know. At 1 p.m. Oct. 21, the board will hold its General meeting.

The 2024 budget will be discussed and board candidates introduced. A draft agenda was recently mailed to members.

New City trash rules require extra cans for all

Sorting of trash into 3 cans to begin by next March

Starting early next year, Murrieta will require that all Knolls residents sort trash into recyclables, so-called organics and regular garbage cans.

And, under the new system, individual residents face fines of up to \$500 if special monitoring trucks detect violators dumping, say, recyclables into regular trash cans, or food waste into recycling bins. Most city areas have been under the rules for two years.

Details are still being sorted out, including how much more Knolls residents will pay for additional cans and pickups. For the past several years, Spring Knolls residents have been paying about \$13 a month for a weekly waste pickup of one can under a senior pricing schedule.

Since last year, other Murrieta households have been paying \$28.74 a month

han count after the third. The cost could be low pay. finalized by November.

Bravo said the additional cans should be delivered no later than February.

The three Knolls units have agreed to join forces to see if they can influence how the new pricing and pickup plan is implemented.

The 3-can arrangement falls under Senate Bill 1383, which was enacted in 2016, and went into effect on Jan. 1, 2022. The legislation aims to cut harmful landfill greenhouse gas emissions from food and yard waste. It also requires certain businesses to donate, rather than dispose of, edible food.

under the new system, more than twice what Knolls residents now pay.

The new system schedule is uncertain for Spring Knolls. All other Murrieta homes have weekly pickup for all three, but Waste Management may consider a lower fee with fewer pickups for a few areas including the Knolls, said city management analyst Isaac Bravo.

The projected hike for Knolls residents could take the monthly rate to \$23.68, but Bravo said that city officials hope to negotiate a plan to spread out the hike over three years so seniors will get a savings the first two years and continue to receive a senior dis-

fund between 50 to 95% of the costs through a "loan" that would not need to be repaid if at least 30 percent of Knolls residents are considered low income at the end of 35 years.

The amount of the grant / loan could rest on how many residents returned the survey. The more responses received could result in a larger grant.

Security Committee member Alan Hanson, during a power-point presentation at the Sept 21 board meeting, supports the gate proposal, but expressed doubt that it could go forward without substantial grant funding.

Initial bids submitted to the Knolls Security Committee range from \$66,750 to \$163,483. The gates would be at West and East entrances of Via Princesa. Any funding shortfall would need to be made up by owners.

Spring Knolls president Sandy Vollmer said that the membership would be asked how any available grant money should be spent before any decision is made.

While a decision awaits a grant funding OK, Hanson said that residents would access unmanned Via Princesa gates via such methods as license plate or windshield decalreading cameras. Other vehicles, such as visitors, emergency personnel or deliveries would also be accommodated in ways yet to be determined.

Hanson said that the gates would likely reduce growing vehicular traffic from nonresidents.

He noted that in recent years, Spring Knolls residents have reported thefts of catalytic converters, golf carts, mailbox deliveries as well as squatters and a recent high speed police chase through one neighborhood.

There is support for the gate idea,

however it is not universal. Warm Spring Knolls' Board has endorsed the gate idea, while the Spring Knolls Board has adopted a more cautious approach to first determine if funding is available.

Meanwhile, Golf Knolls president Billy Rankin, at a Tri-Unit meeting Sept. 15, expressed skepticism that the gates would significantly curb crime. And, he added, if the other two units moved to install gates over Golf Knolls' objections, a lawsuit might result.

Rankin said after the discussion that the Golf Knolls board would continue to study the issue and ask residents their views on gate installation.

Sandy Vollmer said that such a gate plan would require not only funding, but also backing by residents of all three units to succeed since all three, as well as the Murrieta Hot Springs resort, have access easements on Via Princesa.



The best way to stop Medicare fraud? Help prevent it in the first place. Follow these 3 tips to protect yourself from scammers:

- If you get a call, text or email asking for your Medicare Number, don't respond. Don't give your Medicare card or Medicare Number to anyone except your doctor or people you know should have it. Remember, Medicare will never call you unprompted and ask you for your personal information.
- Check your Medicare Summary Notices (MSNs) or claims statements carefully. If you see a charge for a service you didn't get or a product you didn't order (like a COVID-19 over-the-counter test), it may be fraud.

If you suspect fraud, report it at 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227). Visit <u>Medicare.gov</u>, the official source for Medicare information, to learn more about preventing Medicare fraud.

The Boosters-sponsored event was the largest sale yet. Unsold items were either donated to local charities or held back for the next sale.



Getting ready for California's quakes is not an earth-shattering undertaking, so take the time to ensure your safety

Major earthquakes could come from any of the three major faults here in Riverside County; the San Andreas fault, the Elsinore fault or the San Jacinto fault.

Earthquakes can strike without warning and cause significant damage to buildings, roads, and other infrastructure. They can also cause injuries and fatalities.

Being prepared for an earthquake can help you and your family stay safe and minimize property damage.

In the past several years, Spring Knolls residents have felt minor shaking from Southern California area quakes. Most others have gone unnoticed except by seismologists.

There is no way to predict when a large quake and its aftershocks might strike, so being prepared is something you should not ignore.

Here are some steps you can take to prepare for an earthquake:

- Create an emergency kit: Your kit should include enough food, water, and supplies to last for at least three days. You should also include a first aid kit, a flashlight, and a battery-powered radio.
- Make a plan: Create a family emergency plan that includes a meeting place and contact infor-

mation for family members. Make sure everyone knows what to do in case of an earthquake.

• Secure your home: Secure heavy furniture and appliances to prevent them from falling during an earthquake. You should also make sure your home is up to code and can withstand seismic activity.

Older adults should pay extra attention to securing items that might fall in an earthquake and make moving in the home more difficult. Additionally, those taking medications should ensure they have a plan have enough medication to last 3-7 days. Power companies often have programs to help those with powered medical devices with battery backup equipment.

Stay informed: Sign up for the Alert RivCo notification system to receive emergency alerts and warnings. You should also stay informed about risks and preparedness by following the Riverside County Emergency Management Department on social media and attending preparedness training and events.

This block party will be a precursor to the ShakeOut, set for Thursday, Oct. 19 on the same street. Like our 2022 exercise, we'll do a Drop, Cover & Hold On drill with spectators. That will be followed by a simulated earthquake with "victims" being tended to by the SKERT team, and then transported to a First Aid station at the clubhouse. Then we'll have an evaluation by Bonnie Casler and other CERT members, and finish with lunch for all residents.

Lori Miller and Holli Hanson also updated the group on the Temecula Preparedness & Health & Safety Fairs. We plan to have some of the groups speak at our event next year.

We also discussed the entry gate idea the Security Committee has proposed. The HCD (governing body for mobile home parks) has a loan / grant program to help keep mobile home parks viable as affordable housing. They asked if we had "Block Captains" (Area Coordinators), to help pass out an income surveys, which may result in such a project costing us nothing. We will have handed them out by the time you read this!

Your calls can help stop crime, SK criminals

We've been saying "if you see something, call it in to the Murrieta Police Department." And Murrieta PD wants those calls.

Recently, your board met with a Murrieta police officer who's working cases in our area. He specifically said "if residents see something they must call 911 and let us know what's going on."

Your call may help a case the police are working or be the final clue leading to an arrest.

It's not uncommon for someone to say "back when I was on the Board we did this".

Well, it's not back-in-the-day anymore. Federal, state and local laws have

So, work with us and the Murrieta PD, and your Board will continue working with Murrieta PD to make our community a better place.

They usually hold two jelly bean sized eggs in an interior the size of a thimble. Laid eggs take up to 18 days to hatch.
