The Vernal Equinox is fast approaching, on March 20. No doubt you've noticed the days getting longer (exclusive of Daylight Savings Time). In fact, the daily amount of daylight increases (in Spring) or decreases (in Fall) most quickly around the equinoxes. On March 1, daylight lasts 11 hours and 29 minutes and increases to 12 hours and 32 minutes on March 31st (in only one month)!

To Seniors in GKA Community:

Per my last report I advised everyone that I was holding a meeting on Feb. 15, 2025 to discuss our Helping Hands Program Unfortunately, only one person showed up.

Our program has turned from successful in 2024, to almost dead in the water! The purpose of this report is to discuss our ongoing issues and whether or not people care enough to help their neighbors. We only have 5 volunteers that are willing to respond to requests from GKA Seniors to provide assistance! At times these people are not available. We need more volunteers!

I realize that most of our community is involved in work, family and other issues. However, as I've stated in the past, with fewer volunteers we cannot sustain this program!

I have not given up, and I hope residents and neighbors do not do so either.

I am withdrawing several items of assistance due to the lack of volunteers. Here are the types of assistance that we will continue supporting, for now. They include the following:

- TRANSPORTATION: Picking up residents that need assistance to get to their doctor, dentist, etc., and picking them up later and bringing them home. This has been an important service and it will continue.
- SHOPPING: We have quite a few seniors who cannot drive but need someone to take them shopping or if given a list, a volunteer will go shopping for the resident, who will pay them for shopping costs.

There are some ongoing programs where a resident can order their shopping needs online and the store(s) will deliver the items to their home. Unfortunately, this does not work for all residents.

PET WALKING: There are quite a few residents that are willing to walk their neighbor's dogs. In some cases if the resident does not drive, there are some residents who will take a neighbor and their pet to a veterinarian. If residents need this service they should call a director so they can get a name and phone number to call.

 CONVERSATIONS WITH SENIOR RESIDENTS: There are a number of residents willing to talk to seniors by phone or meet them in person.

Surprisingly, there are residents with no family or immediate friends to talk to. This would be a highly important gift to provide to some of our senior residents.

There are still other items that would be helpful for our senior residents. However, until we can "grow" our program and provide more assistance on the above items, we will have to wait. I am asking for additional volunteers so we can meet the current needs of our seniors. Please call me if you have questions or reservations. We can discuss your issues.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM By Mick Herod








The Emergency Response Team is building up its volunteers. There are mandatory training classes being given, to help the entire Team to be on the same page.



POLICE ACTIVITY IN THE KNOLLS Submitted by Ted Vollmer, Spring Knolls News Editor



Early Friday morning, February 14, a high-speed pursuit occurred throughout Murrieta. The pursuit ended abruptly when the suspect's car, skidded into a retaining wall on Via Princesa and Via la Colina.

The pursuit began shortly after 7a.m. on Murrieta Hot Springs Road. The suspect was stopped for an unknown offense and sped off when officers tried to make an enforcement stop.

The suspect's Honda Civic entered Spring Knolls through the East Entrance. Riverside County Sheriff deputies, joined by Murrieta police officers, chased the suspect for several minutes until the suspect crashed into the retaining wall built by volunteers in February 2021. A section of the wall was toppled. Officers closed off Via Princesa until the investigation was completed.



Police said the unarmed suspect was not injured in the crash, and was arrested without further incident.

The sheriff's spokesman said that neither the nature of any charges nor the suspect's identity would be immediately released because the matter remains under investigation.

A Murrieta police officer said he will be contacting Spring Knolls president Sandy Vollmer about repairs to the retaining wall.

[Editor's note by Mick Herod] While the distance from the East to the West entrance isn't much, the timeline suggests that the chase may have lasted much longer within the Knolls communities. I've heard of videos taken by residents, showing police lights and sirens blaring.



TIME FOR GOLF CART MAINTENANCE By Mick Herod

More and more golf carts are out and about, but before you take yours out of "hibernation," you would do well to conduct a bit of preventive maintenance. Since most carts are electric. the most critical maintenance requirement is for your battery to be properly serviced. Why? Because for most, that's the greatest expense if maintenance is neglected. A full set of new batteries is likely north of \$800.

True or false: You should "top off" the electrolyte levels in your batteries BEFORE charging. The answer is FALSE. Why? Because during charging, the electrolyte expands and can overflow if the level is already too high.

Now, if you answered TRUE, you get halfcredit. Here's why: never charge batteries when the metal plates inside each cell are exposed. Add just enough water to cover the plates, charge the batteries completely, then bring the electrolyte to the correct level.

True or false: It's OK to use filtered water or tap water to fill your batteries. FALSE! Using anything other than distilled water can cause premature sulfation of the plates (due to the minerals found in non-distilled water), spelling an accelerated demise of your batteries.

If you've never attempted to fill your own batteries, don't try it unless you're completely comfortable with the process. Beware of the dangers of splashed electrolyte (aka battery acid). You should use eye protection, gloves,

some type of funnel and NO loose jewelry, metal objects or metal tools of any kind (to eliminate sparks or short-circuits).

A flashlight can help you see the fluid levels in each cell. Keep in mind that each cell is closed off from each other cell, so fluid levels can and do vary from cell to cell. After you remove the battery fill caps, you will notice a tube extending down inside each cell. The correct post-charging fluid level is to the bottom of each tube (this gives the electrolyte room to expand during charging or during hot weather). NEVER fill a battery to the top of the cell.

If you're attempting this for the first time, you would do well to search YouTube for "How-to" videos. Watch two or three videos, so you can become comfortable with the process.

The next point of maintenance is to check the tire pressure in all four tires. The maximum tire pressure will be noted on the side of each tire (typically around 32psi). Tires can be filled using a bicycle tire pump, though it's faster and easier to use an air compressor.

Finally, use a dedicated plastic cleaner and clean, microfiber towels for your windshield. Rinse off any loose dirt and dry thoroughly with a clean towel or soft cloth. Meguiar's PlastX works well and can be found at most auto parts stores or Amazon.

A good rule of thumb: If it looks too good to be true. it probably isn't.

Red flags:

"provide your accurate personal information" (your bank account number login and password) See the website address. Whatever comes just before the ".com" is the actual website (retreat.com.).



The actual email shown above came to me last month. Looking at the address on the "From" line, you'll see an email name I don't recognize (Angel Mendez); then look at the two letters after ".com," (which is ".mx"), indicating the email was sent from Mexico.

The actual body of the email looks convincing, but having spotted the two red flags, I knew it was bogus. I forwarded the email to Pat, who (of course) knew nothing about it. The email was deleted and the sender (angel.mendez) has been blocked. OK scammers, you lost this round!
