New panel OKd to study reserves

Standing committee to focus on best uses for association funds

The Spring Knolls Association board has approved the formation of a standing Reserve Study committee to closely examine the clubhouse facility and common grounds for what needs to be replaced or repaired.

Reserve funds are used for everything from a new toilet or a new swimming pool pump to seal coating or repaving of Spring Knolls streets. California law requires HOAs to have an annual reserve study. Those studies involving Spring Knolls have previously been performed by two board members and a certified Reserve Study specialist suggested by the associa-

This is just a reminder that any additions and/or modifications must have prior approval from Spring Knolls HOA.

For roof replacement, as always, start with

the HOA and you'll receive the information to contact the Housing and Community Development department. This step is required by both the county and state.

Failure to follow those steps can result in fines and penalties.

Also, if you're going to have Habitat for Humanity's group, Brush with Kindness, paint your home, you'll still need to have the paint color approved by the HOA.

It's as simple as visiting me in the Office on Fridays, 9:30 a.m. until noon. If you're unable to see me, there are Architectural Request Forms in holders just outside the office. Once you complete them, return them to the office.

I look forward to seeing our residents and working together to improve our community.

tion's CPA.

Per Spring Knolls' current reserve study agreement, an on-site walk through with the specialists is performed every third year. Annual walk throughs would require a higher cost.

Spring Knolls Treasurer Sharon Kilpatrick will chair the new standing committee, which was unanimously approved at the Feb. 19 board meeting.

Initially, the committee will_consist of six Spring Knolls residents — including three board members — and is expected to hold its first meeting in March.

Sharon added that as a standing committee, even with membership turnover, there should always be remaining members who are very familiar with each year's Reserve Study, walk-throughs and any resulting repairs and completed replacements. As a side note, she said that the Spring Knolls current reserve funding status is in a "strong position."

The committee will also conduct an in depth review of each year's Reserve Study Report and identify any inconsistencies that could affect Spring Knolls funding requirements. Committee recommendations will be forwarded to the full board for consideration.

We need to hear if you're making your home safer

where to install 1/8" wire mesh, and other ideas. They also sent us a list of organizations to apply for grants, and more documentation about obtaining homeowner insurance premium reductions.

Let me know if you're taking defensible space/ hardening moves for next year's Firewise submittal.

See next page to learn how your fire safety measures can help you lower your property insurance costs.

We'll have a detailed assessment of The Clubhouse by Firewise (or, the Fire Dept.?). This would be with the New Reserve Committee and SKERT.

And, we'd like to see the Area Coordinators find out which of their residents require help with "home hardening" work.

The Earthquake Country Alliance (ECA), is holding a screening of Quake Heroes, a movie about every day people who became heroes during the 1994 Northridge quake.

Also, as part of this event, there will be an emergency fair. The date for all this is Saturday, March 15 between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. See the notice at the top of this page about signing up for it.

We need more members! Betty Dutton is the last nurse we had in SKERT, and she's moving. Let's recruit new members, especially those with medical backgrounds.

INSURANCE INCENTIVE: Below is a Q &A about possible discounts, under state law, that you could receive on your homeowner's policy, especially if you have made efforts to "harden" your home's perimeter from wildfire vulnerability. While premium reductions are not guaranteed, you are in a better position to negotiate one if you have taken steps to protect not only your own property but those near it.

What does being Safer from Wildfires mean for my Insurance?



Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara is requiring insurance companies to give discounts to residential and commercial policyholders under the Safer from Wildfires framework. Under Commissioner Lara's new regulation, insurance companies also must tell you about the wildfire risk factors on your property — and Safer from Wildfires gives you the tools to reduce your risk and help keep your insurance.

Q: When will discounts be available?

A: As soon as possible. Under Commissioner Lara's new regulation, insurance companies are required to calculate new rates incorporating Safer from Wildfires discounts and submit their data to the Department of Insurance in a rate filing. Each rate filing undergoes a rigorous review by Department of Insurance experts under a transparent set of rules to make sure the rate filings are fair and complete.

Q: How much will my discount be?

A: Discounts will depend in part on your property's individual characteristics and the actions you've taken through Safer from Wildfires. The safer your property is from the risk of wildfire, the more you can save. Different insurance companies may offer different discounts, so it pays to compare.

Q: Why aren't all the discounts the same?

A: By requiring all insurance companies to submit their discounts separately, the regulation encourages competition to benefit consumers. Some companies may be a better fit for you based on your home or location. We urge you to look at all available options.

Q: I am on the FAIR Plan — will I get a discount?

A: Yes – the FAIR Plan will also offer discounts. Contact a licensed insurance broker who is registered to sell FAIR Plan coverage. FAIR Plan's website has a Broker Finder tool that can assist you in finding a broker in your area: https://www.cfpnet.com/.

Q: What safety step will help me get the biggest discount?

A: Insurance companies may give different discounts for specific actions as well as for combinations of actions, so you should check with your insurance company and compare what others are offering. Local fire safety professionals and insurance consumer groups may also provide resources to help you plan for what actions to take first as you continue to make your home or business more wildfire resistant.

Q: When should I request a discount — immediately or when I renew my policy?

A: After completing a wildfire mitigation action, you should contact your insurance company or agent/broker and advise of the completed work. You may need to provide proof that the mitigation action was completed, or an inspection may be required to confirm that the mitigation action was completed. Your insurance company or agent/broker should be able to advise you of the amount of annual premium savings the mitigation action will result in, and the premium savings would be reflected at the start of the next policy period.


