Five step up for board posts Incumbents to fill open seats in 2024 balloting

Five current HOA directors will be the only candidates running for the 2024 board.

At the Oct. 21 General meeting, Nominating Committee Chair Chris Heilbron said that the only people who asked to be candidates were directors Debbie Adelhelm, Shawnee Miller, Jan Towers, Ron Sieber and Sharon Kilpatrick.

During the meeting, there were also discussions about entry gates on Via Princesa, and how new rules governing trash pickups will work early next year. The board is awaiting results of a lots be sent to all owners, and that state grant application to possibly pick up a large percentage of the cost of any gates and awaiting word from the city on a three-trash-can plan to replace the current one-can system Spring Knolls residents have been using for years. Options, as well as the

projected cost for the new system that requires residents to sort their throwaways are still being hammered out.

The trash details are important for the board to know before it can approve a 2024 budget. Answers are expected for the board meeting, at 6 p.m. Nov. 15 in Eaker Hall.

As for the board election. Chris Heilbron asked the audience if anyone else was interested in becoming a candidate and no one responded.

Despite that the election result is, in effect, decided, state law requires balthey be counted at next January's Annual meeting. Board president Sandy Vollmer stressed that everyone receiving a ballot should fill it out and send it back in the stamped return envelope or drop it off in the locked ballot box at the board office.

Not the 'Big One'? No, more like a runaway freight train

While under one of the Eaker Hall dining tables during the "drop, cover and hold on" drill at the Oct.19 ShakeOut event, I had a flashback.

It was Oct. 1, 1987, and our kids and I were huddled under our Los Angeles dining room table during the 5.9 Whittier Narrows quake.

The kids and I had just left the house (don't want to be late

for school) when the sound of a freight train coming through the yard started, and the shaking began. It was 7:42 a.m. and we rushed back inside, dove under the table and hung on.

The quake's epicenter was in Rosemead, just four miles from us. Experts say the shaking lasted about 20 seconds.

I beg to differ.

School and work did not happen that day or for several days while damage assessments were being conducted. Roads, homes, buildings, bridges, schools, etc. all had to be evaluated for safety before life as we knew it would resume. And the inevitable aftershocks . . . well, we really got to know that table . . .

The City of Los Angeles had already anticipated that a large quake was going to happen, sooner or later. The largest previous one was on Feb. 9, 1971, centered in Sylmar.

While smaller, the Whittier quake caused an estimated \$380 million in damage to thousands of buildings, and killed eight people. It also came as a total surprise to seismologists because it occurred on a previously unknown fault line.

The Los Angeles school board in its wisdom and in anticipation of the "Big One," had required schools to be stocked with emergency rations for up to 10 days for every student and staff member.

Seismic experts also estimated how long it would take each parent to reach their children in the event table during the Oct. 19 ShakeOut. The Drop, Cover & Hold On drill triggered her memories of the disastrous 1987 Whittier Quake near Los Angeles. See page 10 for ShakeOut story.

of a major quake. Ted and I both worked in downtown Los Angeles at the time. They estimated that it would take us 8 days to walk the 4 miles home due to shattered glass from high-rise buildings, downed power lines, damaged roadways and other dangers. We carried shoes, water, jackets, a first aid kit, flashlights, etc.; basically a "GO" bag, in our cars at all times.

I'm telling you this story to convey that you never know when or where a disaster will occur. And the more you prepare and practice for it; the better your chances are for a happy ending. At least a good ending.

I encourage everyone to get "GO" bags of emergency supplies ready, stash them in the designated places; under your bed, in your car, etc. Let's get prepared — "under-the-diningroom-table prepared" — if you know what I mean.

Before using a tape measure, make sure you follow the rules

I'd like to remind all SK Homeowners / Residents that any Architectural changes on your property must follow our Rules and Guidelines as well as Declarations of Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions.

If they aren't followed, you may be subject to Fines and Penalties.

Per Spring Knolls CC&R's: Architectural Control — Article IX, 9.1 Improvements in general; establishment of Architectural Review Committee: No improvements (as defined in Section 9.2) of any kind shall be commenced, erected or maintained within the Properties, nor shall any exterior addition to or change or alteration be made in or to any Lot until the plans and specifications showing the nature, color, kind, shape, height (including front, side, and



rear elevations), materials, and location of the same shall have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Associations Architectural Committee as to quality of workmanship and materials, harmony of external design and location in relation to surrounding structures, setback lines, topography and finish grade elevation.

9.2 Improvement Defined — "Improvement" includes, without limitation, the construction, installation, alterations, or remodeling of any buildings, walls, decks, fences, swimming

pools, landscaping, landscape structures, skylights, solar heating equipment, spas, antennas, utility lines, or any structure of any kind.

In no event shall the term "Improvement" be interpreted to include projects restricted to the residence interior and which do not involve the roof or any load-bearing wall thereof.

Per Spring Knolls R&Gs Architectural Control : New construction, alterations, or additions of any kind require prior written approval of the Architectural Review Committee (ARC). A paint color sample must be provided to the ARC before painting the outside of any building on any lot. Repainting may be required if the color does not conform to the approved sample.



10/19 at 10:19 a.m. We asked all attendees to

download the MyShake Ap, which was supposed to go off at 10:19. Some didn't get the alert until 20 minutes later, depending on what address they put into their phones.

We also did a Drop, Cover & Hold On earthquake exercise, and discussed what SKERT (Spring Knolls Emergency Response Team) does: Street block parties, how we always need new members, why we mark home utilities with colored tapes, and the contents of Go Bags we have at the house.

Retired Santa Barbara County fire captain Ed Carey gave a presentation on wildfire preparedness, when to evacuate, how much clear space you need around your house, and other tips on best practices. He then showed several attendees how to use water-style fire extinguishers against a "fire" (just a stack of wood, not really on fire).

Later, Rachel Hollinger, Murrieta's Disaster Preparedness Coordinator, shared tips on how to report overgrown weeds and trees, and other tips for how best to alert the City to what's going on in your neighborhood.

Attendees received various prizes, including tools to turn off the gas meter valve, solar battery chargers, headlamps, fire extinguishers, First Aid kits, and even gift cards. All guests went home with a prize! And before they left, everyone had pizza and cookies. It was a great exercise, and we look forward to doing a 6th ShakeOut next year.

multi-faceted fentanyl crisis. It will consider educating the public, treatment options, preventative measures, and improving public safety. The task force will include healthcare workers, law enforcement and public health agencies. It will identify tools to keep communities safe and hold accountable those making and distributing fentanyl.

In 2020, California saw nearly 4,000 fentanyl overdose related deaths and in 2021, fentanyl overdose became the leading cause of death of Americans aged 18 to 45.
