Sharp-eyed resident helps head off sink hole collapse

A few mornings after the Nov. 15 thunderstorm drenched Murrieta, Lori Miller was heading from her home on Via del Sur when she saw something that made no sense.

Near Via del Sur and Via Playa del Rey was a patch of water. The rest of the street was dry. And there was no visible water running to it.

"It wasn't raining and it was too early for anyone to be washing their car," Lori recalled. "There just should n't have been water there."

The likely water source was below the paved street. Not a good sign.

Lori phoned compliance director

Charlene Kirkwood, who called Debbie Adelhelm, the SK Director who oversees Spring Knolls' streets. Debbie, who lives on Via Playa del Rey, raced over. Like Lori, she felt there was a

problem, but wasn't sure what it was.

Debbie called the Eastern Municipal Water District. An inspector came out, drew a line around the spot and told her there was no imminent danger and it could be weeks before repairs were made. Nevertheless, Debbie set up warning cones.

Board president Sandy Vollmer, meanwhile, also inspected the water patch, called EMWD and was told there was no emergency, because there was no gushing water. He told her though that someone would check on the site every day.

Sandy insisted that a sinkhole collapse could happen unless the water issue was addressed in days, not weeks as Debbie had been told. She reminded the official about the two large sink holes in 2019 and 2020 on nearby Alta Murrieta that cost the city hundreds of thousands of dollars to fix.

"Water and asphalt don't mix," she told the official. "We're a senior community, and it will be on you if you don't get something done soon."

Nine days later, on Nov. 29, a work







crew tore up a strip across Via Playa del Rey. An EMWD worker told the *Spring Knolls News* that water had undermined the street so much that a collapse could have happened that day or the next. Within hours, the crew finished its repairs and reopened Via Playa del Rey.

Had Lori not spotted the problem, and had Debbie not installed cones on the street and had Sandy not insisted something be done soon, a car, pedestrian or bicyclist might have fallen victim to another Murrieta sink hole.

Lori, an area coordinator with the Spring Knolls Emergency Response Team (SKERT), said her father was in construction. When she was a child he told her that if she saw something that seemed out of place, she must tell someone right away. Luckily for her neighbors, Lori listened to her Dad.

And she did.



Here are effective ways to drive rats from your home

T'was the night before Christmas when all through the house, not a creature was stirring not even a mouse...oh no, it's RATS!

Per the Spring Knolls Rules and Guidelines, Section 18 states that owners must keep their property clear of any accumulation of decay or flammable material.

Rats are attracted to bird seed, pet food and water left outside. They particularly like sunflower seeds, especially the hulls discarded by birds.

Rats also like places to hide. They will nest in untrimmed palm trees or in the engine of a vehicle, doing costlydamage. It is suggested to rake up leaves and other debris from your yards to discourage nesting.

Also, trim dense vegetation, especially where it is near the ground.

Clear your patio/driveway of stored items where rats can nest.

The following can be used to repel rats: garlic, onion, hot peppers, ammonia, used coffee grounds, peppermint, eucalyptus, white vinegar and citronella oil.

Doing these simple things can help get rid of them and discourage their return.

I wish everyone a wonderful Holiday and peaceful New Year.

schedule. If that's preferable to you, please fill out that form right away and send it to us.

If you wish to keep your current payment plan, ignore the form. More information will be included in your invoice coming later this month.

The other form, required by California, asks if you'd like to shift to a mostly e-mail form of delivery of documents. If enough people shift, it would save a lot of money and hundreds of hours of volunteer time spent preparing and sending out every item.

You might ask, why bother sending all this stuff out? Wouldn't that also save a lot of time and money?

It would be great if we could. Unfortunately, state and federal laws require the mailing of many items. And the laws also say that many publications must be in *separate* mailings.

Back to our latest mailing ... and your please read what we send you.

money. As board president Sandy Vollmer says in her cover letter, there's no dues increase. Beginning in March, however, a monthly hike of about \$10.68 in everyone's trash pickup costs will bring your total to about \$23.68 a month. Waste Management will then begin to bill you separately instead of with your dues.

Once that payment shift occurs, you can expect a pro-rated refund of trash costs from the association. The new system involves three cans for recycling, organic waste and other items. The Spring Knolls News will provide updates on the new system and costs..

There is much more in the mailing you're getting — a new Neighbor-to-Neighbor harassment policy and insurance costs. We urge you to check those sections as well.

We realize that with all the mail we already receive, yet another piece from your association can be annoying. We're owners too, and we get it.
